



A native of Italy, Dr. Antonio Palladino received his medical degree with highest honors from the University of Naples, Italy, and served his residency in Obstetrics and Gynecology at Baltimore City Hospital, University of Maryland Division.



As a faculty member in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at West Virginia University from 1964-1974, Dr. Palladino served as vice-chairman and director of the student teaching program. He later served as a clinical professor and was on the staff at Monongalia General Hospital. From 1974 until his death in June 1991, Dr. Palladino practiced with Drs. Walter A. Bonney and Kamal M. Behnam in Morgantown. He was certified by the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology and the Italian Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

In December 1991, Mrs. Adriana Palladino established the Antonio Palladino Lectureship in Obstetrics and Gynecology. Mrs. Palladino, who trained in Italy as a pharmacist, was a volunteer at Ruby Memorial Hospital. She was a researcher in the Department of Pharmacology and Toxicology at the WVU Health Sciences Center from 1966-1970.

DR. DANIEL CLARKE-PEARSON

Daniel L. Clarke-Pearson, MD is the Robert A. Ross Distinguished Professor and Chair of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, NC.

Dr. Clarke-Pearson was born and raised in Southern California. He attended Harvard College, majoring in Biology. He was a two-year varsity football letterman and played in the epic 1968 "Harvard Beats Yale: 29-29 Game." After working as a technician in a vascular laboratory at the West Roxbury Veterans Administration Hospital in West Roxbury, MA, he attended Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine in Cleveland, Ohio.

Dr. Clarke-Pearson completed a residency in Obstetrics and Gynecology (Roy T. Parker, MD, Chair) and a fellowship in Gynecologic Oncology (William T. Creasman, MD, Director) at Duke University, Durham, NC. He joined the Duke faculty as an Assistant Professor in the Division of Gynecologic Oncology in 1981. Between 1985-87, he was the director of Gynecology and Gynecologic Oncology at the University of Illinois in Chicago (William Spellacy, MD, Chair). He returned to Duke University Medical Center in 1987 as a tenured Professor and Director of the Division of Gynecologic Oncology (Charles B. Hammond, MD, Chair). He was named the James Ingram Professor of Gynecologic Oncology in 1993. Throughout his Duke tenure, he was the director of the fellowship in Gynecologic Oncology. Sixteen of his eighteen fellows accepted academic positions in university medical centers.

In 2005, Dr. Clarke-Pearson accepted the role of Chair of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. He is the Robert A. Ross Distinguished Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology at UNC.

In 2016, US News ranked the UNC ObGyn Department #11 in the US and #1 in North Carolina. In 2017, the UNC ObGyn Residency was ranked #2 in the US and #1 in the Southeast. The UNC ObGyn Department ranked eighth in NIH funded research in 2016.

Prevention of VTE in Gyn Surgery: Unanswered Questions

Venous thromboembolic events (VTE) are serious complications that follow gynecologic surgery. Applying evidence-based clinical research, the majority of VTE may be prevented. Stratifying patients based on their risk assessment is important to provide the appropriate prophylaxis. Prophylaxis may include the use of low dose heparin, low molecular weight heparins, graded compression stockings, and/or intermittent pneumatic leg compression. For patients at highest risk, pharmacologic treatment and compression may be used simultaneously. Further, prolonged prophylaxis after hospital discharge may further reduce VTE in very high-risk cancer patients.

Despite 40 years of clinical research, there remain questions yet to answer so that we may offer optimal, cost-effective prophylaxis to all of our patients. Issues remaining unanswered include:

- Is the risk-assessment model (Caprini Score) appropriate for gynecologic surgery patients?
- Which patients undergoing minimally invasive surgery (MIS) should receive prophylaxis? Are there MIS patients who would not benefit from prophylaxis?
- Which patients will benefit from "combination" or "dual" prophylaxis?
- Which patients will benefit from "prolonged" prophylaxis?

At the conclusion of this presentation, participants should be able to:

- Provide evidence-based VTE prophylaxis
- Describe the advantages/disadvantages of different prophylactic methods
- Discuss which patients undergoing minimally invasive surgery should receive prophylaxis
