Learning Objectives

West Virginia's Response to the Novel H1N1 Virus: Implementation of a Coordinated Antiviral and Vaccination Distribution Plan*

- Determine who meets current CDC guidelines for treatment or prophylaxis with antivirals.
- Determine who meets current CDC and West Virginia guidelines for vaccination.
- Counsel patients on the potential adverse effects of antivirals and the novel H1N1 vaccine.
- State the details of the current H1N1 vaccination program.*
- Implement appropriate pharmacy practice procedures related to the dispensing of West Virginia's state cache of antiviral medications.*
- Implement appropriate pharmacy practice procedures related to vaccination with the novel H1N1 vaccine.*

How to Survive a DEA Audit or Find = Fine*

- Describe the types of criminal and civil actions that can be imposed by a federal prosecutor's office on a pharmacy, including the type of fines that can be imposed through a criminal or civil action.
- Identify the steps taken by the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) in enforcing these laws and regulations, especially the DEA Office of Diversion.
- Discuss the DEA requirements pertaining to: Initial/Biennial Inventory; Executed or Voided DEA Forms 222 and Invoices; CMEA Certification Requirements; Power of Attorney; Thefts and Losses; Drug Destructions; and the Storage of Prescriptions.
- Identify the DEA requirements pertaining to: Alarm Systems; Pharmacy Security; Hiring of Employees, Proper Drug Disposal; Prevention of Thefts and Losses; and other security issues.
- Identify what records are required by DEA as part of the pharmacy on-site audit investigation, and their authority to inspect.

Student Pharmacist Session - *Student Pharmacist Leadership: Learning to be an Agent*

- Identify strategies to create opportunities from challenges.
- Describe the relationship between leadership and advocacy.
- Discuss the influence of change agents on policy and law.

- Explore opportunities for pharmacy practice outside traditional pharmacist roles.
- Discuss opportunities to expand your career options before you graduate.

WVeScript and MediWeb-Additions to the Medicaid Pharmacy Program*

- Discuss technological applications adopted by the West Virginia Bureau for Medical Services for enhancing medication management for Medicaid patients.
- Describe the Federal government's emphasis on health information technology and information exchange, including Medicare's e-prescribing incentive and disincentive program.
- Describe the benefits of ePrescribing for the prescriber, pharmacist, and patient.
- Describe the flow of information from the prescriber to the pharmacist during the e-prescribing process.

- List five new agents approved by the FDA in 2008 - 2009.
- Identify a website that will assist in finding new drugs and their monographs.
- Explain how to get updates from the FDA on drug related issues (new drug approvals, shortages, recalls, etc).
- Identify the website that addresses vaccines and schedules.

2009 WV Legislature and Law Update*

- Discuss study resolutions underway by the West Virginia Legislature with potential to impact pharmacy such as disposal of pharmaceuticals, diversion, and over-prescribing.
- Discuss bills passed by the 2009 West Virginia Legislature related to pharmacy.
- Discuss issues related to the immunization regulations and collaborative practice.

Precepting Pearls for Enhancing the Student Practice Experience

- Define the characteristics of the millennial student.
- Design a rotation syllabus and calendar.
- Establish expectations for the site and the student.
- Identify reasons for using specific criteria to evaluate student performance.
- Utilize school policy/procedures to respond to student professionalism issues.

Expanding the Pharmacist's Role Within a Reformed Health Care System*

- Describe the challenges and opportunities within the current economic and political environment for the profession of pharmacy to implement a new model of care and assume an expanded patient care role.
- Identify the necessary steps by each stakeholder group to obtain recognition for pharmacists' expanded patient care roles on the health care team.
- Describe initiatives undertaken by APhA and the profession to advance the pharmacist's patient care role within a reformed health care system.
- Discuss the latest activities related to health care reform and the role of the pharmacist.

CEASE Tobacco Cessation Training

- Describe the role of the pharmacist in the tobacco cessation process, positioning them as the initiator of patients quit attempts, not the sole provider of cessation counseling.
- Summarize how the pharmacist can ask about tobacco use and successfully advise patients to quit.
- Explain the importance of pharmacists referring patients to appropriate intensive interventions after initiating the cessation process.

Nuts and Bolts of Establishing a Successful Immunization Practice*

- List key components of West Virginia legislative rule on pharmacist-administered immunizations.
- Develop a "checklist" and timeline for establishing your immunization practice.
- Identify and describe four specific documents that should be maintained in your practice.
- Create a "marketing" toolbox to promote your immunization services.

- Identify state requirements for documentation of immunizations by West Virginia Pharmacists.
- Document patient records into the West Virginia Statewide Immunization Information System (WVSIIS) Web application.
